

IJNRP: INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS

Contributions to the following sections of the journal are welcome:

- Original Research Article
- Review Article
- Case Report/ Field Report
- Short Communications
- Letters to the Editor

Send your contribution by using 5 step method in online submission or directly mail to editor in

Authors should note:

- all contributions must be original work;
- all articles are submitted to an editorial committee for an acceptance decision. Anonymity is preserved between authors and referees;
- assignment of copyright to IJNRP will be requested on acceptance of articles

Presentation and format of Manuscript

- Language use: Uniformly American English
- Abbreviations spelt out in full for the first time
- Use TIMES NEW ROMAN font
- Double spacing
- Margins 1 cm from all four sides
- Use Times New Roman
- Font size 20 for Title (in Bold, Center alignment)
- Font size 16 for Headings (in Bold, Left alignment)
- Font size 14 for text (Justify alignment)
- Figures should be colored

Instruction of Manuscripts writing:

- **Cover Letter:** It should be signed by corresponding author.
- **Title Page:** The title page should carry
 - Type of manuscript (e.g. Original article, Field Report)
 - The title of the article, which should be concise, but informative;
 - Running title or short title not more than 50 characters;
 - The name by which each contributor is known (Last name, First name and initials of middle name), with his or her highest academic degree(s) and institutional affiliation;
 - The name of the department(s) and institution(s) to which the work should be attributed;
 - The name, address, phone numbers, facsimile numbers and e-mail address of the contributor responsible for correspondence about the manuscript.

- **Full Text file:** The text of Original Research Articles, Case Reports, Field Reports should be divided into following sections. The main text of the article, beginning from Abstract till References (including tables) should be in this file. Do not include any information (such as author's name in page headers, etc.) in this file. Use MS Word files. Do not use PDF and do not zip the files. Include figures and tables in the same file, if file size is large, graphs can be submitted as images separately without incorporating them in the article file to reduce the size of the file. Full text should contain:
 - Abstract & Key words
 - Introduction,
 - Conceptual Framework
 - Methodology,
 - Result (with Tables and Figures)
 - Discussion
 - Conclusion,
 - Recommendation,
 - Acknowledgement,
 - Ethical Clearance,
 - Reference according to the Vancouver style

Do not make subheadings in these sections.

Abstract & Key words:

The second page should carry the full title of the manuscript and an abstract (of no more than 150 words for Field reports, Case reports and 250 words for Original Research Articles). The abstract should be structured and state the Background, Objective, Methods and Material, Results and Conclusions. Below the abstract should provide 3 to 10 key words.

Introduction:

State the purpose and objectives of the study along with back ground and need of the study in brief. Do not make subheadings.

Conceptual Framework:

State the theory you had applied in the thesis, attach conceptual framework figure.

Methodology:

The Methods section should all information obtained during the conduct of the study. It should cover research design, approach, hypothesis, setting, population, sample and sampling technique, instruments used, validity, reliability, technique of data collection etc.

Result (with Tables and Figures)

Present your results in logical sequence in the text, tables, and illustrations, giving the main or most important findings first. Do not repeat same data in tables as well as in figures; emphasize or summarize only important observations. Extra or supplementary materials and technical detail can be placed in an appendix where it will be accessible but will not interrupt the flow of the text; alternatively, it can be published only in the electronic version of the journal.

Tables

- Tables should be self-explanatory and should not duplicate textual material.
- Tables with more than 10 columns and 25 rows are not acceptable.
- Number tables, in Arabic numerals, consecutively in the order of their first citation in the text and

supply a brief title for each.

- Explain in footnotes all non-standard abbreviations that are used in each table.
- For footnotes use the following symbols, in this sequence: *, †, ‡, §, ||, , **, ††, ‡‡

Illustrations (Figures)

- Send sharp, glossy, un-mounted, color photographic prints, with height of 4 inches and width of 6 inches.
- Figures should be numbered consecutively according to the order in which they have been first cited in the text.
- Each figure should have a label pasted (avoid use of liquid gum for pasting) on its back indicating the number of the figure, the running title, top of the figure and the legends of the figure. Do not write the contributor/s' name/s. Do not write on the back of figures, scratch, or mark them by using paper clips.
- Labels, numbers, and symbols should be clear and of uniform size. The lettering for figures should be large enough to be legible after reduction to fit the width of a printed column.
- Symbols, arrows, or letters used in photomicrographs should contrast with the background and should mark neatly with transfer type or by tissue overlay and not by pen.
- Print outs of digital photographs are not acceptable. For digital images send JPEG files of minimum 1200 x 1600 pixel size.
- The Journal reserves the right to crop, rotate, reduce, or enlarge the photographs to an acceptable size.

Discussion

Interpretation and implications in the context of the totality of evidence (is there a systematic review to refer to, if not, could one be reasonably done here and now, what this study adds to the available evidence, effects on patient care and health policy, possible mechanisms). Do not repeat in detail data or other material given in the Introduction or the Results section. In particular, contributors should avoid making statements on economic benefits and costs unless their manuscript includes economic data and analyses. Avoid claiming priority and alluding to work that has not been completed. Include strengths and limitations of the study.

Conclusion

Include Summary of key findings (primary outcome measures, secondary outcome measures, results as they relate to a prior hypothesis).

Recommendation

State recommendations for future researchers to conduct study on same field but in different way to get more reliable and diverse data.

Acknowledgement

Acknowledge people or institution that helped to conduct the study by any means.

Ethical Clearance

Write ethical clearance clearly especially for human and animal studies.
